- invite someone from the other church to be your partner (let me know if you need help),
- agree to a time each day to connect by phone,
- share in the reading of the scripture, devotion, and prayer for that day,
- discuss your thoughts about it.

This should take no more than five minutes per day – depending on how long you visit, of course!



This idea was presented at Westminster's most recent Session meeting. When congregations yoke, the pastor should not be the only thing that binds them together. Our ministries, our missions, our love for our neighbor, our faith in God, our desire to follow Jesus, and our reliance upon the Holy Spirit are the ties that bring us together and bind us together as God's people.

My prayer for 2021 is that we will all grow in shalom, in gratitude, and in a strong partnership with our brothers and sisters in Christ... to the glory of God!



Ash Wednesday Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return. 3:20 ECCLESIASTES

An excerpt from the *Companion to the Book of Common Worship* (Geneva Press, 2003, 148)

The Lenten journey from the ashes of death to resurrected life begins on the first day of Lent, Ash Wednesday, which signifies a time to turn around, to change directions, to repent. This first day of Lent reminds us that unless we are willing to die to our old selves, we cannot be raised to new life with Christ. The first step of this journey calls us to acknowledge and confront our mortality, individually and corporately. In many traditions, this is symbolized through the imposition of ashes placing a cross on one's forehead. During the imposition of ashes the words: "You are dust, and to dust you shall return" (Genesis 3:19) are repeated again and again. We are to remember that we are but temporary creatures, always on the edge of death. On Ash Wednesday, we begin our Lenten trek through the desert toward Easter.
